The very first publication of a newly discovered typescript from 1952 – an astonishing satire about the nuclear arms race, the logic of preemptive strikes, and propaganda by Justin Steinfeld (1886-1970), a communist jew exiled in Czechoslovakia and England.

What sounds like a novel plot is the true story here: »Califa or The Love for Anna, The Power Engineer« is the previously completely unknown second novel by the exiled author Justin Steinfeld, whose »Ein Mann liest Zeitung« (A Man Reads a Newspaper, published posthumously in 1984, reedited in 2020) was considered his only novel so far. Jo Hauberg, editor at Neuer Malikverlag, had received the two typescripts from Steinfeld's nephew for publication thirteen years after his uncle's death. Hauberg published one of them – and forgot the second one in a drawer for decades. But with a new war haunting Europe, with gas shortage and propaganda, he was reminded of this old manuscript, typed in London on an English typewriter on carbon copy paper, tied up with a paper cord. He found it and kindly sent it to Edition Nautilus, perhaps knowing what enthusiasm it would find. Because »Califa«, probably written around 1951/52, under the impression of the atomic bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki and against the background of the nuclear arms race and the escalating Korean War, is not only a historically interesting document. It is also an astonishing political satire, a financial and military thriller. The story begins with the collapse of the American Stock Exchange after the currency standard was unceremoniously switched from gold to »C.L.F.«, quickly dubbed »Califa« – which happens to be the new material for atomic bombs – and ends with a nuclear inferno in Central Europe after a preemptive strike by Western powers due to the (false) assumption that the communist opponent also had the atomic bomb.

Steinfeld wrote in a kind of socialist realism that is sarcastic about Politburo meetings under Stalin, with a keen eye for propaganda, information policy, and so-called practical constraints, but with a bitter lesson: as long as there are nations and therefore nationalism, there will be war.



Justin Steinfeld, born in 1886 in Kiel, died in 1970 in Baldock, England. He spent his childhood first in Kiel and later in Hamburg. After completing a commercial apprenticeship, he switched to journalism and theater and was a magazine editor, theater critic and dramaturge in the 1920s. Steinfeld was a member of the Jewish community in Hamburg and close to the German Communist Party, although never a member.

In 1933, Steinfeld was taken into »protective custody« and was briefly interned in the Fuhlsbüttel concentration camp. In 1934 he managed to escape to Prague where he wrote for various papers of the German exile press. After the Munich Agreement in 1938, he fled via Poland and Sweden to Great Britain, from where he was interned in Australia with a number of other German exiled authors when the war began. However, he was soon able to return to Britain, where he lived until his death. His novel »Ein Mann liest Zeitung« – so far considered his only one – describes the fate of German emigrants in Prague in the 1930s and is an important document of German-language exile literature.

Afrik – that's what they call him, the old man who lives in a hut above Pfaffenweiler. In times of bad harvests and hunger, this winegrowing village in Baden, south of Germany, had hoped to get rid of its poor once and for all when it financed their emigration to Algeria in 1853. They were promised a paradise there – in a land of no return. In order to raise the money for the crossing, the municipality had a forest cut down and sold the area to winegrowers. They named the vineyard Afrika. But in Algeria nothing but hunger, disease and war awaited the emigrants. Among them was Franz Xaver Luhr with his mother.

He is the only one who has returned, and he is now preparing his revenge: for decades he has been driving a tunnel into the vineyard in order to blow it up. He's almost done. But one winter's day, there is a boy sitting on the bench in front of his hut, with only a note with him that says: Je m'appelle Jacob. Tu es famille.

Based on true events, Sven Recker tells the story of two voiceless people in a touching way and creates a literary monument to the outcasts of Pfaffenweiler.



Sven Recker was born in Bühl/Baden in 1973 and lives in Berlin. »Der Afrik« is his third novel. His previous books »Krume Knock Out« and »Fake Metal Jacket« were staged in theatres and made into radio plays. In 2015 an excerpt from »Krume Knock Out« was selected for the Festival of German Language Literature in Klagenfurt.

What if our well-meaning political opinions were based on fake news? Peter Larsen's job is to feed us the lies we want to believe, until he gets a taste of his own medicine.

Peter Larsen (39) is a famous next-generation war correspondent. One of those smart guys who get really close, deep into the stories of refugees, war victims and catastrophes. He fearlessly interviews warlords and sends live footage of bombings – always online and as close to the action as possible. Renowned editors love his unfiltered reports and interviews. But it is all fake news. He produces his stories in Berlin. The “cast” of his improvised mobile videos consists of refugees; his “new” is pieced together from internet content. But business is going rather too well. Larsen has long since lost touch with reality. He has grown careless: he drinks too much and makes silly mistakes. He is about to be unmasked when he is lured into a trap – by a fake.

The attractive Syrian Leila, who he met online and with whom he has fallen in love, invites him to Beirut. Immediately after his arrival, he is kidnapped and taken hostage to Damascus, where he is forced to use his propagandistic talent to support Assad's regime. Leila turns out to be a member of the secret service. In the martial reality of the Syrian civil war he must painfully realize that not only his career, but his whole life is ruined. And so he makes the surprising and life-threatening decision to fight for his survival – as a journalist and as a human being.

Klara Schindler is 19 years old, she has switched a lower middle class future for independence after her father caught her in her bed with her – female – piano teacher. Now she lives in a gloomy cellar in Hamburg, tries to collect benefits (when she can get the paperwork done) or to eke out a living on day-to-day jobs. Without a piano, but with revolutionary enthusiasm: hyperinflation, hunger and unemployment are making life hard, many workers are on strike and the Communist Party is steadily growing with angry people. A better society seems within reach, and also urgently needed.

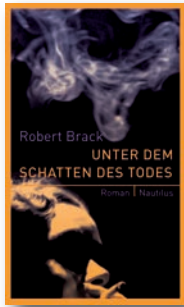
Klara has a talent for speaking in public, so she becomes a militant agitator for the young. She is herself impressed by Ketty Guttmann, a communist member of parliament, women's rights activist and journalist who organizes sex workers in St. Pauli. Ketty is in many ways completely different from the Moscow-focussed leaders that Klara knows.

So Klara has a crush on Ketty, but she's in love with Selma. Selma doesn't care about working in a factory, not even a workers-owned one, she doesn't care about party line loyalty either. She makes a living as a pick-pocket and and by pretending to be a prostitute but robbing the men instead of what they expect. Klara feels that Selma's zest for life is indeed more attractive than the factory.

But a mysterious »reaper« stalks the streets in Hamburg, attacking prostitutes with a kind of scalpel, wounding them in a way that they realize only after a few seconds that the are bleeding. One day he stabs Selma, and other friends of Klara's soon thereafter. When even Ketty is attacked, Klara knows that she is herself in danger ...



Robert Brack was born in 1959 and lives in Hamburg. He also writes under his pen name Virginia Doyle. He won the »Marlowe«-Award of the Raymond-Chandler-Society for »Das Mädchen mit der Taschenlampe« (The Girl With The Flashlight, Edition Nautilus) and has been awarded the German Crime Award for the novel »Gangsterbüro« (Gangsters' Office, Edition Nautilus). He has published more than ten crime novels, three of them true crime novels with journalist Klara Schindler as the main character, set in the 1920s (see next page).

»Is this really my family story? Or is this the common downfall of a complacent society that, after decades of living beyond its means, begins to falter?«

In 2021, an art gallery owner made Hans-Christian Dany the offer to write twelve texts for a lump sum, which would gradually be published online. No special topic required, no minimum number of characters. The assignment leads Dany to his own childhood, his relationship with his father, the bankruptcy of his parents' company and how they dealt and still deal with failure. The paid writing mutates from a literary journey into the disintegration of a family, which turns out to be a symptom of life in a sick country in post-war times. Dany writes about his legacy in a legal and a figurative sense, about emotional demands and liabilities between art and big money. What is ultimately written is also an attempt to determine Dany's own position in waning neoliberalism.



Hans-Christian Dany was born in Hamburg in 1966, where he works as an artist, writer, curator and consultant. He also published *Speed. Eine Gesellschaft auf Droge* (2008), *Morgen werde ich Idiot. Kybernetik und Kontrollgesellschaft* (2013), *Schneller als die Sonne. Aus dem rasenden Stillstand in eine unbekannte Zukunft* (2015), and *MA-1. Mode und Uniform* (2018).

Nipples are boring – or erotic. Normal – or scandalous. Everyday life – or court matter. What makes the subtle difference is the gender of the person whose nipples we talk about. And it is this subtle difference that repeatedly turns the nipple into a political issue.

When Gabrielle Lebreton from Berlin wanted to sunbathe topless at a water playground in 2022 next to half-naked men, the police were called and she subsequently lost her case in court. In the same year, activists in Göttingen fought for all genders to be allowed to swim topless in swimming pools, which was granted – but not on weekends. And while social media companies struggle to curb hate speech and fake news, female nipples are carefully censored. For fear of what exactly?

Julia Fritzsche looks back into the history of covering and revealing human bodies. When did the female breast become erotic, when did shame dominate and when did the urge for liberation? What makes Femen's protest a scandal, what is the concern behind #freethenipple and what do the feminist discourses about »topless« and Muslim headscarves have to do with each other? One thing is clear: dealing with nipples is political – and it's about more than just bathing regulations.

Where is society in Rojava today, a decade after the revolution?

For left movements around the world, Rojava embodies the real possibility of a better society: In July 2012, the revolution began there. In the three Kurdish cantons of Afrîn, Kobanê and Cizîrê, autonomous self-government was established, based on the values of grassroots democracy, gender equality and ecology. The »Autonomous Administration of North and East Syria« now controls about one third of Syrian territory. It unites different ethnic groups, religions and languages under one roof.

Since 2012, the region has had to defend itself against numerous threats. In addition to the military, diplomatic and economic disputes with the Assad regime, the main threats are the wars with Turkey and the IS. With the Syrian civil war, the region is also affected by an embargo, which severely affects basic services. Despite all these adversities, society has evolved and built relatively stable structures.

A decade after the beginning of the revolution, Christopher Wimmer examines the ideas and the reality of this »revolutionary society« from a critical but solidary perspective. Based on more than fifty interviews with people from all parts of society – from administration, the education system, the military, medicine, etc. – he creates a polyphonic picture of everyday life, in a mixture of reportage and analysis, showing the hopes and problems of local people.



Christopher Wimmer, born in 1989, is a sociologist, freelance journalist and author. In 2022 he reported for several months from northern and eastern Syria for newspapers and journals (Neues Deutschland, Frankfurter Rundschau, taz, WOZ and others).

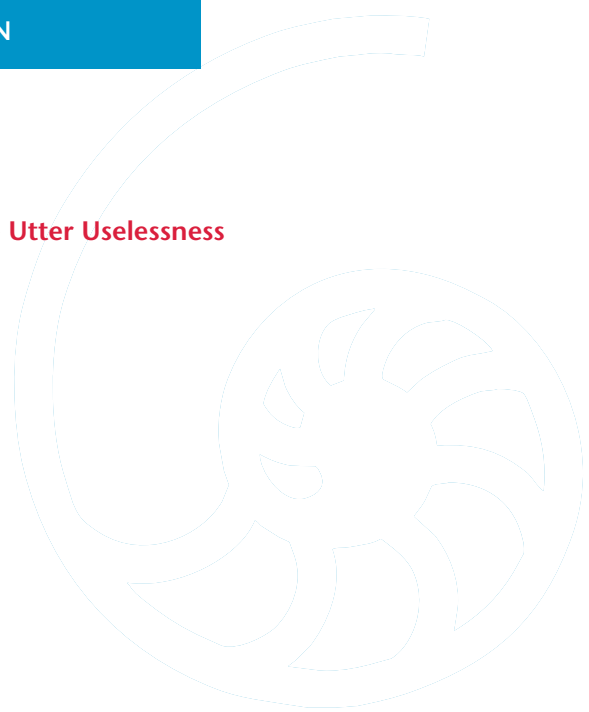

This poetic and philosophical debut is the story about an estrangement and two unequal men.

»What you don't see« accompanies an anonymous narrator who is leaving out of the blue, into the open. The existence of the text itself is a paradox, addressing an audience that was never supposed to exist. Written in Nowhere, an untraceable old coal mining area close to the highway. This is where the narrator finds an abandoned storage hall. It seems perfect for his plan to build a paper labyrinth that nobody should ever lay eyes on. He is driven by anger and fed up with the art industry, he aims for something bigger: a work of enormous dimensions, so big that it seems doomed to fail. But he is taking up the challenge with a fierce enthusiasm and the knowledge that perfection can only grow and exist in complete futility. Eventually, he meets his counter figure who he calls Giacometti. Giacometti is a rugged old man from the village that had to give way for the coal mining. He shows resistance against the course of things, keeping the village awake by telling its story while staring into the emptiness of the mine. The two men keep a close watch, searching for each other, but some distance always remains. Both dwell in and around the mine, becoming allies in the protection of the place against its discovery by outsiders. But the uncertainty if the presence of one will become too much for the other stays. This book is the literary exploration of the question of how far one goes.



Magdalena Saiger, born 1985, studied German language and history in Berlin and Madrid. Since 2011 she lives and works in Hamburg and has just submitted her doctoral thesis in history to the University of Hamburg. (In 2020, she won the »Förderpreis« for literature of the city Hamburg in the category novels. The children's audio play »Wolle und Sommer« was invited to many festivals, lastly to the »berliner Hörspielfestival« 2020.)

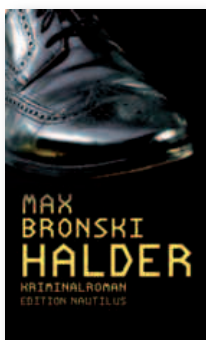

As he wants to sort and check his impressions, he seems to poke a hornet's nest with his questions. Now he really wants to know, but the journey into the past has its price...



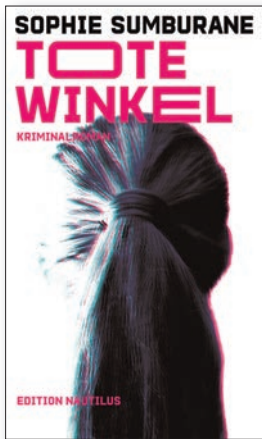

One day she gets a call from the police: her husband has raped a woman and admitted to it. The victim is Katja Sziboula. She is a journalist, non-fiction writer; cold, controlled, living in a symbiotic marriage and constructive work relationship with Kay, a linguistic professor from South Africa who teaches in Potsdam. When Valentina arrives at the police station and the officer shows her a photograph of the victim, Valentina recognizes herself on it, with a blue eye and a bloody lip. Did her husband really just mistake the two women, like she thinks at first? Is Katja her supposedly dead twin whose birth and death certificate she owns? Taking turns, Valentina, Katja and Kay tell a story that pulls the rug out from under your feet: suspenseful, shattering, outrageous.



Sophie Sumburane, born 1987 in Potsdam, studied German and African Studies at the University of Leipzig as well as at the German Institute of Literature in Leipzig. She did her doctorate at the Alpen-Adria University of Klagenfurt. She is the author of many crime novels, has written for a wide range of different media and is active in anti-racist work. She is part of the network »Herland – Feminist realism in crime literature« and founding member of the board of PEN Berlin.

Rainer Roloff leads a secluded life. If you asked him about his employment history, he would describe himself as a private scholar. Structure and routine are added to his life thanks to a long-term study on the influence of sleep on memory, in which he takes part as a test subject. He regularly travels from Cologne to Düsseldorf, even during the pandemic, to record his thoughts in the laboratory after waking up.

Roloff, one year older than the Federal Republic of Germany, is an ideal and productive subject, with an elephant's memory and an awareness of the connection between the collective unconscious and individual memory. Doctor Meissner, the director of the study, finds most of what his test subject tells him »very felicitous«, a mixture of historical and personal memories and playfully absurd still-dream logic. But then the memory of the sleep researcher Dr. Meissner himself gets out of balance...

Once again, Jochen Schimmang proves to be a master of a nonchalant melancholy, a subtle chronicler of history of which he is the most sympathetic observer.



Jochen Schimmang, born 1948 in Northeim, grew up in Leer, Northern West-Germany. He studied political sciences and philosophy at the Freie Universität Berlin from 1969 until 1974. Afterwards he worked as a professor at different universities in Germany and in adult education. Since 1993 he lives in Oldenburg and works as an author and translator. He has published seven books at Edition Nautilus.

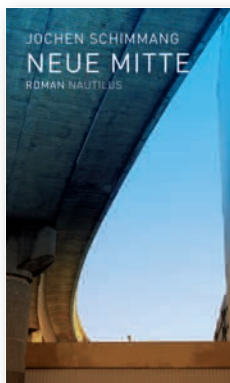

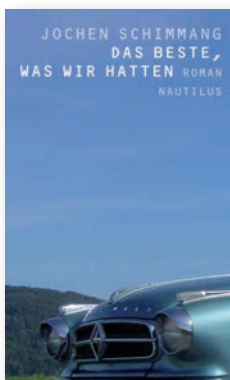

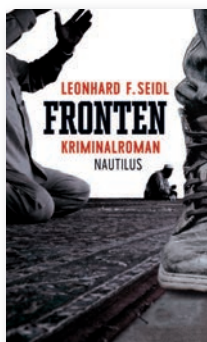

Bavaria, 1922. Oswald Spengler, highly appreciated in right-wing conservative circles after the publication of his book »The Decline of the West«, is on his way to Georg Escherich, the founder of an anti-republican militia. 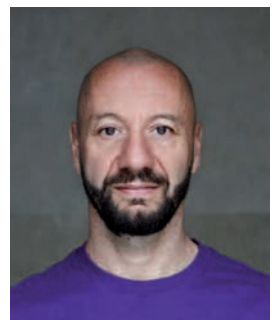

A better life seems within reach as he is taken to artistic circles in Paris by a painter friend. But finally he has to turn back to Switzerland, where he lives in the woods, homeless. One day, he sees Agatha there...

In his artfully composed novel, Flavio Steimann intertwines the fate of two people who could not escape their destiny.

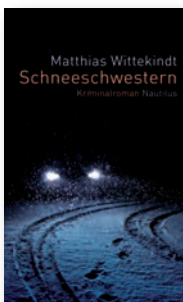

Only in Europe in the 19th century, female ejaculation was being ridiculed, fought, ousted, tabooed, and finally largely forgotten – until it was rediscovered in the 20th century. "Spritzen" is a well-read and entertaining display of how female ejaculation was understood and judged, how certain concepts of female sexuality and the female body made the perception of female ejaculation possible, or impossible, or exploited in mainstream porn business, when female squirting cumshots were discovered as a source of income rather than pleasure.

Recently, a lot of new publications on vulva, vagina or menstruation appear, showing a renewed interest in the female body. A current and well-founded inventory of female ejaculation is not among them.

Stephanie Haerdle closes this gap. Her book aims to entertain, surprise, provide arguments and inform. It explains the »hardware« that makes female ejaculation possible (clitoral complex and female prostate), it explores anatomy, gynecology and urology.



Stephanie Haerdle studied Modern German Literature, Cultural Studies and Gender Studies (M.A.) in Berlin, where she also lives. She has published a book on female circus artists (AvivA Verlag, 2007).

An analysis of police violence and institutional racism from a Cultural Studies viewpoint – as well as a plea for a constructive debate

After the assassinations of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor in the USA, the need for a durable change in the mentality of the police has become obvious – worldwide. For Europe, too, the question arises: How to explain the extent of police violence and police discrimination against people of color? Where to start the urgently needed changes for a new police culture?

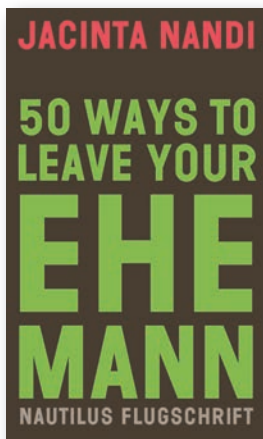
In her essay, Georgiana Banita shows: The powerful image of the “stranger” has always been the target and even the ideological foundation of Western police apparatus. The narrative of the suspicious, potentially dangerous “stranger” was at the origin and still is the backdrop of a general police suspicion against people with a migration background, black people and people of color.

In the USA, for example, the police introduced lethal firearms only after the abolition of slavery in order to discipline freed slaves, and Europe also militarized its police force as a result of migration from rural and colonial areas to the industrial centers. Banita’s analysis on the use of firearms, racial profiling, computer searches and AI-supported crime prognoses, on deportation, border protection and infection protection shows: The logic and practices of police control architectures cannot be imagined without the idea of a necessary defense from the (supposed) foreigner.

“Phantombilder” unfolds a cultural history of police suspicion and creates the basis for a constructive debate that we urgently need.



Georgiana Banita was born in 1980 in Bârlad, Romania. She studied English and German languages and literature at the Universities of Iași and Konstanz. In 2009, she obtained a PhD in American Studies with a thesis on US American and British literature (minors: Comparative Literature and Media Studies) at the University of Konstanz, and spent a year as a Doctoral Fellow at the English Department of Yale University. In 2021, she obtained a Habilitation at the University of Bamberg, where she also teaches as a private lecturer. In 2016, she initiated the conference “Black America and the Police”, in 2018 the conference »Automatisms of suspicion: Police culture and prognosis in the migration society«, both at the University of Bamberg, where she led various research projects, including »Security for everyone: Police culture in one immigration society«.

How to Leave Your Man: Why it's so hard for mothers to leave their partners

She's finally done it! The „World's Worst Housewife" has left her partner and moved with her two children into her own apartment, or as she puts it: been gentrified away to the outskirts of Berlin. Jacinta Nandi had always expected that as a single mom, a whole other host of problems would be awaiting her. The main problems are financial: the truth is, it's really hard for ordinary mothers – with ordinary incomes – to leave their partners and set up their own lives.

Why does society make it so hard for women to leave men? Could it be that women in general, and mothers in particular, are not expected to be free? And if they do decide to fight for their freedom, they have to pay a high price for it.

Jacinta Nandi writes about slut-shaming and pity, the pressure to constantly justify yourself and society's pesky double standards. She shows us that it's not only the violent relationships that are shitty, that being told what a great dad your ex is isn't always helpful and why Isaac Newton was certainly not a single parent. She asks why married women show a lack of solidarity by baking ridiculously good cakes, and what it means to be a single mom by choice. Why do mothers always have to be perfect while fathers are somehow always good enough? What has to change in order for mothers to no longer feel forced to stay in relationships that are not serving them? Leave your husband – things can only get better!

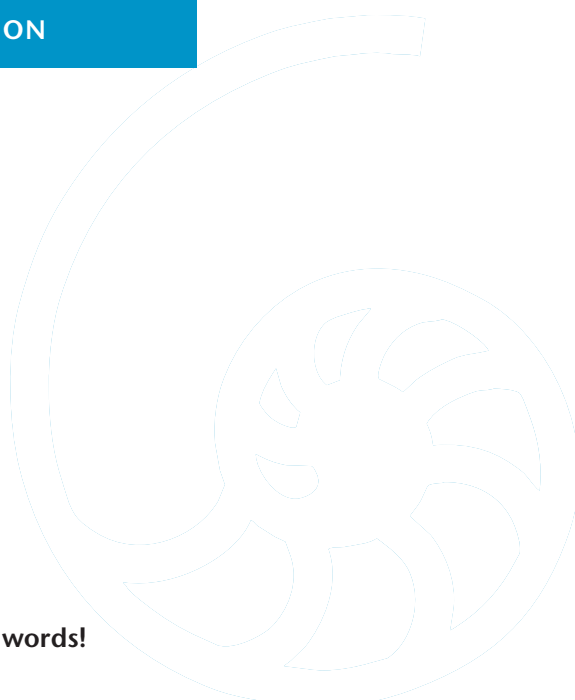

Ende Gelände is a German expression meaning roughly: the fun is over. But Ende Gelände is also the name of a movement for climate justice, based in Germany but gaining international momentum.

There are thousands who are committed to a climate-friendly world, fighting for the end of CO₂ emissions. They carry out mass actions by the hundreds, the end of carbon-based energy at the top of their agenda, they want to ensure that fossil-based capitalism will be a thing of the past as soon as possible.

Since 2015, the alliance has organized numerous actions of mass civil disobedience against coal energy in opencast mining areas. They occupy coal mines and power plants and influence the debate on the phase-out of coal-based energy, the climate crisis and climate justice with their actions.

Ende Gelände is a Europe-wide alliance against coal and gas and, along with Fridays for Future, one of the most prominent groups in the climate justice movement. Ende Gelände was established in 2015, is organized into local groups and task forces and regularly carries out civil disobedience actions, often with several thousand participants.

An exploration into history that points towards a future of climate justice

The imminent climate and environmental crisis is the result of historically grown and thus overturnable social conditions. Milo Probst takes the reader on a tour of emancipatory battles of the 19th and early 20th century to show just what is possible – there is always an alternative. He shows connections and roots from the past from which something new can grow:

Probst thus rediscovers Pierre Quiroule, an anarchist activist and author who, in the early 20th century of Buenos Aires, committed himself to a broader understanding of solidarity not only among humans, but including nature. He rediscovers a British socialist, Edward Carpenter, who tried to motivate workers to fight against air pollution in the 1890s, a Cuban independence fighter, the anarchist and feminist Louise Michel and many others. Their stories show that real humanity is possible – in joint battles, in real solidarity and by breaking up with a system of methodical dehumanisation.

Environmentalism of the 99 percent is a reinvention of anti-capitalist traditions. It is definitely anti-racist, feminist and decolonizing, internationalist and class struggle focused. All of us who are exploited, discriminated against and excluded by the current system need to unite in understanding that climate justice and environmentalism are genuine social questions.



Milo Probst, born in Basel in 1991, is a historian at the University of Basel and is currently writing his PhD thesis on environmental criticism in anarchistic movements of the late 19th and early 20th century. He is mainly interested in the links between science and activism and is himself committed to climate justice.

**Similarities of western right-wing populists to radical Islamists
 are not merely coincidental – they share the same origin**

“Neocolonialists!” – “Islamic Terrorists!”, these are the accusations with which the old and new right in the west and Islamists all over the world refer to each other. Apparently, right-wing populists and jihadists are sworn enemies. But if you take a look at the writings and authors that both movements refer to, you will find the same sources: Ernst Jünger, Martin Heidegger, Alexis Carrel. All three of them serve as reference not only for the New Right but also for the pioneers of radical Islam.

Marc Thörner points out the common origin of these thoughts and their different but still related manifestations today: Both movements condemn secularism, liberalism and homosexuality, both commit to traditional social structures and values like religion, order and obedience, self-sacrifice and martyrdom, both fight individualism and rationalism.

In Syria, radical Islamists and the political right already act like allies. Will they continue their mutual hostility in Europe or will they soon congregate here as well?

For his research, Marc Thörner spoke to Alexander Gauland of German far right party AfD and travelled to the frontlines of Syrian civil war; he interviewed leading representatives of the Assad Regime, talked to Iranian writers, met Lebanese fascists and followers of Hisbollah as well as historians and Arabists in Europe.



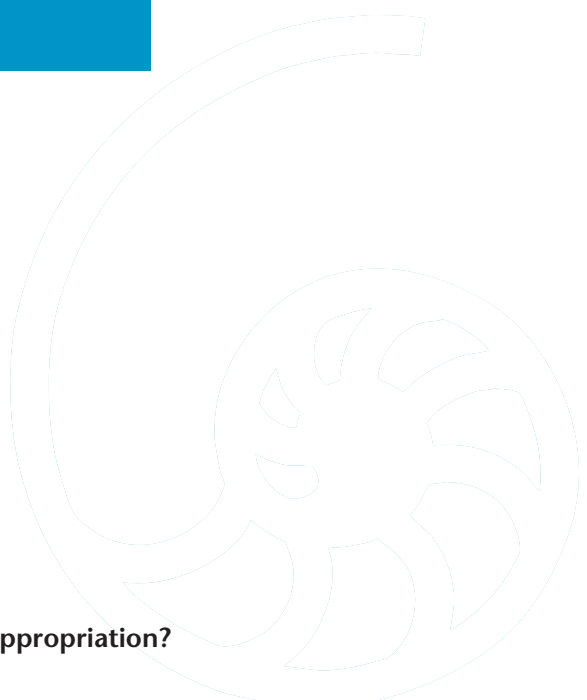

What are we talking about when we discuss cultural appropriation?

Yes, there have always been adoptions and appropriations of techniques, skills, motives etc. in arts and culture throughout history. We learn from each other, of course. That is not the point though. Cultural exchange is not the same as cultural appropriation.

Lars Distelhorst – from a white male perspective consciously so – writes about a subject that is as omnipresent as it is inadequately theorised, with an extraordinary potential to polarise. Ethnic party-costumes or dreadlocks, white soul music or yoga – are those cultural appropriations? Discussions tend to escalate quickly here.

Distelhorst demonstrates how the macro and micro levels of cultural appropriation are connected. He discusses various definitions of the term, including the alleged assumption of essentialist cultural concepts. He analyses three dimensions of cultural appropriation: looted art and artefacts from colonised people, the unasked-for representation of other cultures, and the consumption of culture as commodity.

Finally, Distelhorst relates cultural appropriation to anti-racist and anti-capitalist perspectives to use it in fighting against persisting systems of power and domination.



Lars Distelhorst, born in Georgsmarienhütte in 1972, studied political science at the University of Bremen and holds a PhD on Gender Politics from the Freie Universität Berlin. Living in Berlin, he is professor for social science at the university of applied sciences Clara Hoffbauer in Potsdam. His most recent publications are “Kritik des Postfaktischen. Der Kapitalismus und seine Spätfolgen” (Fink 2019) and “Leistung. Das Endstadium der Ideologie” (transcript 2014).

“If you want to change something, you mustn’t hide”, says Amed Sherwan.

He was born into a devout Muslim family in Iraqi Kurdistan. The impulsive, unfocused child feels different from his peers from an early age. He seeks support in his religious belief – until he accidentally comes across a text critical of Islam at the age of fourteen. What frightens him as blasphemy at first soon appears more plausible to him than anything he has learned so far. Amed breaks away from Islam. But when he confides in his father, this turns out to be a big mistake: his father reports his own son for blasphemy, Amed is arrested and tortured. Because of his young age, the case gets major media attention in Iraq, Amed is publicly known and in mortal danger. All he can do is to flee to Europe.

In his new home Germany, Amed fights for “Oriental Diversity” and the right to freedom of expression and belief in Muslim communities. His provocative actions have earned him hostility from various sides, but also great solidarity.

With humor and astonishing optimism, he tells the story of his childhood and youth – and of his life as a “refugee face” in Germany.



Amed Sherwan, born in 1998, is the youngest person to be arrested and tortured in Iraqi Kurdistan for blasphemy. He has lived in Flensburg since 2014 and is now a blogger and activist. **Co-author Katrine Hoop** is a criminologist, communications consultant and cultural worker. She is bilingual and belongs to the Danish-Frisian minority in Schleswig-Holstein.

Agility is demanded by everyone in an increasingly project-oriented society under all circumstances. The new spirit of capitalism goes hand in hand with technologies and practices of measuring the self. The worker-entrepreneur or franchisee of digital-capitalistic business models becomes the role model. UBI becomes the more or less social system of digital capitalism.

Today, software is being developed with agile methods: short sprints, working prototypes, new roles replacing traditional project management methods. This also has effects far beyond the industry: life itself is increasingly becoming a project. In the course of the "new spirit of capitalism" (Boltanski), self-optimization, lifelong learning, entrepreneurial validation of one's own workforce and biography, and indeed of the entire self, are managed with agility.

It used to be different. At the time of the normal working day, linear work and life biographies, the pre-recorded linear sequence of school, education, professional life and pension, life spluttered like that. Today, on the other hand, the old waterfall model, in which successively different phases of the project take place, building on each other, not only in software development, has become obsolete. Setting milestones and being an achiever, a performer – not only has the wording become part of the subjectivity of the Digital Generation – we have become the product owner of our own life project, one sprint chasing the next.

"Timo Daum's book offers a history and critique of agile methods, puts them in context both historically as part of management's history in both dominating the workforce and increasing its productive output. The book gives an inside view on how highly collaborative code production in the agile factory is taking place, explores its predecessors from the division of labor through Taylorism and lean production, and concludes that the agile revolution has led to a kind of digital Taylorism for the general intellect producing mind-workers, in the global digitally connected sweatshop, what he calls the cogni-facture or cognifactory. What would Karl Marx make of Facebook and Twitter? If Marx were to return today, he would be faced with a paradoxical situation. On the one hand, there is the internet, a worldwide supranational infrastructure for communication and production, free and accessible for everyone; there are Unions, equal rights for women, free school education and progressive income taxes.

On the other hand, we would have to tell him, much to our regret, that capitalism still rules, that issues of political representation, social equality and fair distribution of resources still appear on the agenda. We would have to tell him that the admirable digital infrastructures are in perfect accord with a new capitalism that does not produce and sell industrial manufactured goods anymore, but organizes access to digital data.

Left-wing criticism focusing on mass surveillance and Big Data, or lamenting the loss of hard-won workers' rights is too short-sighted. Digital Capitalism is often criticized from a pre-digital position and either denied or trivialized as being bound to fail by itself.

How and why Ingrid Strobl once bought the most famous alarm clock in German post-war history

In December 1987, the journalist and author Ingrid Strobl was arrested in her apartment in Cologne. She was accused of “membership in a terrorist organization”, according to the infamous §129a in German Penal Code.

She had bought an Emes Sonochron alarm clock – for a friend, she said, who asked her this favour. This alarm clock was later used as a time detonator in an explosion that struck a Lufthansa building, causing severe property damage. The attack was planned by the so called “Revolutionary Cells”, who wanted to protest against the practice of fly-out deportation of asylum seekers. Ingrid Strobl approved publicly of the attack.

After her arrest, she refuses to give away the name of her friend and remains in custody. In prison she gets to know a world that has been completely alien to her, a world of pain and addiction, of anger and submission. She copes with prison mainly by working hard on her book on female resistance in German-occupied Europe, which she had started before her arrest.

In June 1989 she is sentenced to five years in prison. After an appeal, the Federal Court of Justice finally sentenced Ingrid Strobl to three years in prison in 1990, for complicity in an explosive attack.

Thirty years later, Ingrid Strobl reflects in this very personal book about prison life, women's political activism and individual responsibility. She also questions the legitimization of resistance and violence.



Ingrid Strobl was born in 1952 in Innsbruck. She studied in Innsbruck and Vienna and graduated with a PhD on Rhetoric in the Third Reich. She works as a freelance journalist since 1977 and writes for the radio and press. She has published several books and lives in Cologne.

**»When it comes to animals, the left is turning far right«, says Amir
 and strikes an inspiring counterblow**

Bertolt Brecht once hung posters in theatre halls reading “Don't stare so romantically”. Well, Amir shows that it is high time as well to stop looking at “nature” so romantically.

Criticizing environmental damage by capitalism or industrial livestock breeding is based in most cases on a conservative idea of an “untouched nature”, sometimes it even praises medieval forms of animal farming. Amir: “While usually no-one except clerical fascists would turn to medieval times when searching for a model for Good Living, the most enlightened minds do so when it comes to animals.”

Politics instead of ethics: If you look for bourgeois DIY-advice on urban beekeeping, this book will deeply disappoint you. Instead, Amir examines the important role of headstrong and unruly pigs in the development of modern factories and reports on the “swinish multitude's” insurrection – humans and non-humans together – that repeatedly shocked New York a century ago. “Being and Swine” is an antidote to any sad cultural pessimism that can only ever see animals as “total victims” of human hegemony. Amir, instead, shows how to see animal history from a perspective of struggle: If animals can be seen as perpetrators, offenders, public enemies and resistance heroes, the slogan “no pity, but solidarity” becomes convincing.

Cigarettes, estrogens and bird's nests: Birds drinking water from London's sewage will get veritably doped by the estrogen it contains – which makes them sing far better and find more partners for procreation than their “uncontaminated” fellows. In Mexico, more and more birds weave cigarette butts into their nests, thus diminishing vermin that threatens the health of their chicks. Only two examples of a new ecology that governing politicians and biology teachers likewise would most definitely abhor.

No space is innocent – but so what? We live in post-Chernobyl and post-Fukushima times. There is no turning back to the supposed pureness and innocence of a pacified Garden of Eden. But dealing with urban ecologies might be a real chance for new concepts of conviviality and resistance in surprising places: stubborn grandmas feeding pigeons as a form of public militant mass defiance, for instance. Where there are cities, there are pigeons. And where there are pigeons, there is resistance!



Fahim Amir is a philosopher and cultural scientist, working at the intersections of nature, cultures and colonial historicities, transcultural agency and urbanism. He is currently teaching at the Department of Experimental Design of the University of Art and Industrial Design Linz. Amir was curator of the Live Art Festival 2013 *Zoo3000: Occupy Species* (Kampnagel, Hamburg) and *Salon Klimbim: Feeding Vegetarian Tigers – Entertaining Utopian Sensibilities* (Secession Vienna, 2014). Amir co-edited *Transcultural Modernisms* (Sternberg Press, 2013) and provided the afterword to the German translation of Donna Haraway's *Companion Species Manifesto* (Merve, 2016).

Can we really say that living together rests on a cost-benefit ratio? Is everyone pursuing only their own interests and does capitalism really have the final say in history? Or rather aren't we thoroughly sharing and giving beings?

Frank Adloff advocates for new kinds of conviviality, based on the writings of French anthropologist and sociologist Marcel Mauss. Adloff demonstrates that every human being is essentially a giver and that only the gift can create confidence and sociality. Thus, giving is the basis of any society. He shows that the gift is crucial for rethinking fundamental questions of philosophy, politics, sociology, culture and economics. In his vision for a convivial economy and society, he considers the role of political experiments in civil society as well as sustainable and cooperative conceptions of nature.

Conviviality aims for solidarity and self-limitation; it is an alternative to profit seeking, exhausting economic growth and excessive consumption. Therefore, Adloff presents the concept of *homo donator* instead of *homo economicus*. Yes, humans are able to cooperate for the well-being of everyone, if only the capitalist logic of utility maximization can be overcome.



Frank Adloff is professor of sociology at Hamburg University. His research focuses on social theory, gift and conviviality, civil society, post-growth and sustainability. He has published most recently *Gifts of Cooperation, Mauss and Pragmatism* with Routledge (2016) and co-edited the German publication of the French *Manifeste convivialiste* (2014) as well as the anthology *Konvivialismus. Eine Debatte* (2015).
